

East Carolina University is the third largest of six constituent institutions of the University of North Carolina. Enrollment, as of 2017, stands at nearly 29,000. The university has ten professional schools with a 18:1 student-to-faculty ratio. The university is located within a two-hour drive of both the state capital in Raleigh and the Atlantic Coast beaches.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Graduate assistantships are sometimes available for full-time students. Assistantships will usually be in the Department of Political Science, but sometimes can be located in other academic units. Also, the Federal Work Study Program is now open to Graduate students. This program can help finance one's education and does not require repayment. If you qualify for this program, you can be employed by the department in a graduate assistant-like capacity. - A minimum of 24 s.h. above the 2999 level

BA vs. BS

Students who wish to receive the Bachelor of Arts in Multidisciplinary Studies: Security Studies must also complete a foreign language through level 1004 (12 s.h.). Foreign language skills can have a significant positive impact on the employment opportunities in this field.

There is no foreign language requirement for students pursuing the Bachelor of Science degree.
