BACHELOR OF ARTS

- General Education Requirements: 40 semester hours (s.h.), consisting of Written Communication (6 s.h.); Natural Sciences (7 s.h.); Social Sciences (9 s.h.); Humanities and Fine Arts (9 s.h.); Mathematics (3 s.h.); Health Promotion and Health-Related Physical Activity (3 s.h.), and a General Education Elective (3 s.h.)
- Foreign Language: Demonstrated foreign language proficiency through level 2004 (12 s.h.)
- **Core:** 36 s.h. Required courses are: POLS 1010, 2010, 2020, 2090, 3031; and at least one course in political theory.

Must include a minimum of 18 s.h. selected from POLS courses numbered above 2999.
